
Lunar New Year Cultural Presentation

Group Presentation | 5 minutes | Slides Required

In this presentation, your group will explore a cultural topic related to **Lunar New Year** (such as traditions, food, symbolism, customs, history, or modern celebrations). Your goal is to **teach the class something meaningful** in a clear, engaging way.

Presentation Requirements

- Each group will give a **5 minute presentation**.
- The presentation will be **in English**.
- All group members should participate and speak.
- You must use **slides** to support your presentation.

Slide & Language Expectations

- Slides should include **key vocabulary written in Chinese characters** (keywords only, not full sentences).
- Choose words that represent **important ideas or cultural concepts**.
- Be prepared to **explain what each Chinese word or images/photos used means and why it matters**, in English.
- Quality matters more than quantity—**a few accurate, well-chosen characters are better than many**.
- Other related info, including video clips, could be in English.

References Slide (Required)

- Your presentation must include **one final slide** listing your sources.
- Include **at least 2 credible sources** (websites, articles, books, or videos).
- Sources should help support your cultural information and research.
- You may write references in **English**.
- Simple format is fine (links or titles)—this is **not a formal research paper**, but sources should be clearly identified.

What We're Looking For

You will be evaluated on:

- **Content & Research:** Your information should be accurate, thoughtful, and show real research (not just basic facts).
- **Organization & Clarity:** Ideas should be easy to follow and fit within the time limit.
- **Public Speaking:** Speak clearly and confidently, make eye contact, and engage the audience.
- **Slides:** Slides should be visually clear, organized, and help explain your ideas (not too much text).

- **Preparation & Effort:** It should be clear that your group practiced and understands the material well.

Tips for Success

- Don't read directly from your slides—use them as a guide.
- Practice together if you are in a paired group so your timing feels natural. If you are presenting on your own, practice with a timer or in front of a friend to build confidence.
- Focus on helping your classmates understand **why** your topic is important, not just **what** it is.
